- 1. We are called to **Accept One Another**, **Build Up One Another**, **Remind One Another** and **Please\* One Another**. (\*Please can also be translated "serve.")
- 2. We must remember that eternity is at stake.
- 3. We are all going to "croak" and stand before Holy God in a judgment (for the <u>unbeliever</u>, it's a judgment unto death and punishment; for the <u>believer</u>, a judgment unto life and rewards.)
- 4. The <u>foundation</u> of this judgment is Christ being Master over all people; a <u>forbearance</u> is called for, due to that fact that we will all stand before Christ in judgment; and the <u>features</u> of this judgment are: every knee bowing, every tongue confessing and everyone giving an account of their lives to God.

# Pleasing Others—Not Ourselves!

## 1. The Duty of Pleasing Others.

Romans 15:1–2, HCSB - <sup>1</sup> Now we who are <u>strong</u> [in their faith—they have a lot of maturity in Christ] have an <u>obligation</u> [lit., a debtor under obligation—to owe someone something] to <u>bear</u> [the same word used in the Gospels of Jesus bearing His cross, cf., Luke 14:27] the <u>weaknesses</u> [those with little maturity in Christ] of those without strength, and not to <u>please</u> [Gk: ἀρέσκω (ha-RES-ko) a present, active complementary infinitive; lit., to <u>serve</u>, to please, to bless, to make content] <u>ourselves</u>. <sup>2</sup> <u>Each one of us must please</u> his neighbor for his good, to build him up.

**Romans 15:2, NCV** - <sup>2</sup> Let each of us <u>please our neighbors for their</u> good, to help them be stronger in faith.

• Paul is dealing with the issue of selfishness (Do you please yourself or others?)

# 2. The Demonstration of Pleasing/Serving Others.

Romans 15:3–4, HCSB - <sup>3</sup> [Paul now uses a doctrinal sledgehammer to crack a behavioral nut] For even the Messiah did not please Himself. On the contrary, as it is written, The insults of those who insult You [ie., God] have fallen on Me [ie., Christ; quoting Psalm 69:9 when King David is pictured taking the abuse of the people because he stood up for God]. <sup>4</sup> For whatever was written in the past was written for our instruction, so that we may have hope [this "hope" is especially needed by Christians when facing suffering in the midst of Christian and non-Christian relationships] through endurance and through the encouragement from the Scriptures.

- Notice the Example of the Savior.
- Notice the Encouragement of Scripture.

## 3. The Delight in Serving One Another.

Romans 15:5–7, HCSB - <sup>5</sup> Now may the God who gives endurance and encouragement allow you to live in <u>harmony</u> with <u>one</u> [the secret of a great church is found in the little word "one" (used 4x in this passage)] another, according to the command of Christ Jesus, <sup>6</sup> so that you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ with a <u>united</u> [ie., one] mind and <u>[one</u>—it's repeated here] voice. <sup>7</sup> Therefore accept <u>one</u> another, just as the Messiah also accepted you, <u>to the glory of God</u>.

Romans 15:5–7, NLT -<sup>5</sup> May God, who gives this patience and encouragement, help you live in complete harmony with each other, as is fitting for followers of Christ Jesus. <sup>6</sup> Then all of you can join together with one voice, giving praise and glory to God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>7</sup> Therefore, accept each other just as Christ has accepted you so that God will be given glory.

Paul calls us to imitate Christ in pleasing and serving other people rather than ourselves.
