Overview of the Book of Jonah

Overview: Jonah is the autobiography of a reluctant prophet who did not want to preach

repentance to Israel's enemy, the godless Assyrians, in their capital city,

Nineveh.

Jonah: 700s BC: Best known for getting swallowed by a huge fish, Jonah bears yet

another incredible distinction among God's prophets. He gave only one

prophecy ("Forty days from now, Nineveh will be destroyed" –

Jonah 3:4) in the book named after him—

and it didn't come

true.

Location: Nineveh is near what is now Mosul, Iraq.

The Fish:

The original Hebrew language simply calls it a dag gadol literally translated "big

Nineveh

fish." (Note: A whale is a mammal, not a fish.)

Theme: God's grace to all people—if there is repentance.

Lessons: You must not run from God's call in your life; God's love and mercy is available

to all people; Disobedience leads to catastrophe in your life; there is no limit to what God can—and will—use to get your attention; failure does not necessarily disqualify you from God's service; disobedience affects the lives of others you come in contact with; nationalism/patriotism should never stand in the way of

God's plan; and God is concerned about the heart of all men.

Key Verse: "I know that You are a gracious and merciful God, slow to anger and abundant

in lovingkindness, One who relents from doing harm" (4:2)



1. The Order

Jonah 1:1–2, HCSB - ¹ The <u>word of the LORD came</u> [notice the Divine source] to <u>Jonah</u> [born in Israel but lived there only a few decades before his country got erased from the world map by one of history's most vicious empires—Assyria] *SON* of *Amittai*: ² "<u>Get up! Go to the great city of Nineveh</u> [largest city in the world at that time, 500K pop., capital city of the Assyrians] and <u>preach against it</u>, because their <u>wickedness</u> [like ISIS of today—they loved to see people tortured and killed] has <u>confronted</u> [lit., "come before me"] Me."

2. The Objection

Jonah 1:3, HCSB -³ However, <u>Jonah got up to flee</u> to <u>Tarshish</u> [God commands Jonah to go 600 miles to the East, so he fled more than 1,200 miles to the West] from the LORD's presence [God said "go" and the prophet said "no"]. He went down to <u>Joppa</u> [the nearest seaport to his home town] and found a ship going to <u>Tarshish</u> [on the southeast coast of Spain]. He paid the fare and went down into it to go with them to <u>Tarshish</u>, <u>[away]</u> from the LORD's presence.

3. The Ordeal

Jonah 1:4, HCSB - ⁴ Then the LORD <u>hurled a violent wind on the sea</u>, and <u>such a violent storm arose</u> on the sea that <u>the ship threatened</u> to break apart.
