A. A Word about Our Sins

- All our sins are scandalous before a Holy God.
- All of us have sinned.
- Any of us are deceived if we say we have no sins.
- All our sins will be known—in time.
- Our sin will take us further than we ever intended to go; keep us longer than we even intended to stay; and cost us more than we ever intended to pay—Sin always cost us our dreams.
- The result of sin is death.
- Sin is a universal malady that has affected every single person.
- We can pretend that sin is *no big deal*, but every time we do, it is at our peril.
- Our sins are a big, terrible, heinous deal!
- Today, God offers His complete forgiveness of our sins

B. A Word about Our Savior

1. Who came?

Matthew 1:20, NASB95 - ²⁰ ...an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife; for the Child who has been conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit. NOTE: Mary was with child by the Holy Spirit, apart from normal relations with a man. God Himself, can interrupt the laws of His creation to accomplish His purposes. The Virgin birth is essential to the deity of Christ and the sinless humanity of Christ.

Answer: Jesus Christ, born of the virgin Mary, is none other than the eternal God in human flesh. We call Him by His name—"Jesus." (r., Gen.3:15, Is. 7:14, Jer. 31:22, Luke 1:26-38; Luke 1:26-28, Matt. 1:18-20, Uk. 1:35, Heb. 2:14, Phil. 2:7, Gen. 5:1-3, Rom. 5:15-21, Eph. 2:1-2, 1 Pet. 1:18-19 Heb. 9:14.

2. Why did He come?

Matthew 1:21, NASB95 - 21 "She will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins."

<u>Answer</u>: He came to save people who could not save themselves.

3. Who will He save?

Matthew 1:21, NASB95 - 21 "She will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save <u>His people from their sins."</u> NOTE: Matt. 1:21 is a fulfillment of Psalm 130 specifically v. 8.

Answer: Clearly, "His people."

4. How will He save His people?

Revelation 5:9, NASB95 - ⁹ And they sang a new song, saying, "Worthy are You to take the book and to break its seals; for You were slain, and purchased for God with Your blood men from every tribe and tongue and people and nation.

Answer: By His substitutionary death on the cross.

C. A Word from Our Savior.

- 1. Admit that you are a sinner—who cannot save yourself—and ask the Savor to save you.
- 2. Receive and give forgiveness this Christmas season.
- 3. Hold on to hope when you don't know how to cope—Jesus still saves this Christmas season.
