- 3. Job's friends will speak 'some truth' but 'much error.'
- 4. Their main theory is false. Their position is that 'the righteous will never suffer.' All three men gave the same reason why Job was suffering: "You have sinned!"
- 5. Eliphaz bases his 'rebuke' on two things: His misuse of Scripture and a vision.
- 6. Eliphaz the Temanite was from Teman, an Edomite city that was known as a center of wisdom (Jeremiah 49:7).

# B. Eliphaz's First Speech (Part One)

# 1. Eliphaz's Approach (vv. 1-6)

Job 4:3-6, NASB -3 "Behold, you have <u>taught many</u>, And you have <u>strengthened weak hands</u>. 4 "Your words have <u>helped the stumbling to stand</u>, And you have <u>strengthened feeble knees</u>. 5 "<u>But</u> now it comes to you, and you are impatient; It touches you, and you are horrified. 6 "<u>Is your fear of God not your confidence</u>, And the integrity of your ways your hope?

- You have helped so many people with your preaching.
- Now, it's time to practice what you preach.

## 2. Eliphaz's Accusation (vv. 5-11)

**Job 4:7, NASB** - <sup>7</sup> "Remember now, who ever perished being innocent? Or where were the upright destroyed?

• "Do the innocent really suffer? (Answer: Yes, of course)

**Job 4:8, NASB** - 8 "According to what I have seen, those who plow wrongdoing And those who sow trouble harvest it.

• "You reap what you sow, Job, and you really asked for this."

### 3. Eliphaz's Argument (vv. 12-21)

Job 4:12–17, NASB - <sup>12</sup> "Now a word was brought to me secretly, And my ear received a whisper of it. <sup>13</sup> "Amid disquieting thoughts from visions of the night, When deep sleep falls on people, <sup>14</sup> Dread came upon me, and trembling, And made all my bones shake. <sup>15</sup> "Then a spirit passed by my face; The hair of my flesh stood up. <sup>16</sup> "Something was standing still, but I could not recognize its appearance; A form was before my eyes; There was silence, then I heard a voice: <sup>17</sup> 'Can mankind be righteous before God? Can a man be pure before his Maker?…

- "Who do you think you are, Job?"
- "Who ever perished being innocent, Job?"
- "Do you really think you are not suffering because of your sin?"

### C. How to respond to those who are suffering

Who is someone you know, right now, going through the fire, like Job did?

- **1. Bring Friendship—not flattery.** ("The Ministry of Presence")
- 2. Bring Comfort—not condemnation. (Don't talk; do something)
- 3. Bring Encouragement—not "holier-than-thou" experience.
