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A. Job's Previous Response (Chapter 12)

JOB'S POINT: The One who really knows is God—and not you three guys!

"I am equal with you."

"I have been falsely accused by you."

"I have this argument for you:"

"Only God is all-knowing and all-powerful!"

B. Job Continues His Response (Chapter 13)

1. Job's Strong Criticism of His Friends. (vv. 1-12)

Job 13:1–5, NLT - 1 "Look, I have seen all this with my own eyes and heard it with my own ears, and now I understand. 2 I know as much as you do. You are no better than I am. 3 As for me, I would speak directly to the Almighty. I want to argue my case with God himself. 4 As for you, you smear me with lies. As physicians, you are worthless quacks. 5 If only you could be silent! That's the wisest thing you could do.

2. Job's Strong Confidence in God. (vv. 13-19)

Job 13:15, NIV - ¹⁵ Though He slay me, yet will <u>I hope in Him;</u> I will surely defend my ways to His face. Job 13:16, NIV - ¹⁶ Indeed, this will turn out for my deliverance....

Job 13:15–16, NCV - ¹⁵ Even if God kills me, <u>I have hope in him</u>... ¹⁶ This is my salvation....

3. Job's Strong Appeal to God (vv. 20-27)

Job 13:20–21, TLB - ²⁰ "O God, there are two things I beg you not to do to me; only then will I be able to face you. ²¹ <u>Don't abandon</u> me. And don't terrify me with your awesome presence.

A. Job asks God to not do two things:

- i. Don't abandon me. (v. 21a)
- ii. Don't terrify me. (v. 21b)

B. Job asks God five questions:

- i. Is all this happening to me because of my sins? (v. 23)
- ii. Why do You hide Your face against me? (v. 24a)
- iii. Why do You regard me as Your enemy? (v. 24b)
- iv. Why do You bring terror to a "leaf?" (v. 25a)
- v. Why do You chase after a "straw?" (v. 25b)

4. Job's Strong Lament Over His Own Frailty (v. 28)

Job 13:28, MSG-^{28[} [If you leave me, God, I'll be] "Like something rotten, human life fast decomposes, like a moth-eaten shirt or a mildewed blouse."

C. "If God is Sovereign, Why All of This Suffering?"

Review from "The Pastor's Study" this past week: Suffering is part of living in a fallen world; Suffering is unrelated to personal goodness; and suffering amplifies God's message—we need a Savior (and His name is Jesus!)

- 1. We must never look to our circumstances to understand God.
- 2. We must look to God's Word to know about God and ourselves.
- 3. "Why do 'bad things' happen to 'good people?" (Are you really 'good?')
- 4. Nothing in this fallen world will ever be safe, secure, certain, or fair.
- 5. God promises that only in Heaven will all things be made right.
- 6. God is postponing His rescue so that more people can be saved.
- 7. Faith means more than "Believing in God," it means "Believing God!"
