

The LORD is NEAR! Philippians 4:1-7

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Message Section

1. The Problem

Philippians 4:1–3, NASB 2020 - ¹ Therefore [lit., "so then" meaning in light of all that was stated in Chapter 31, my beloved brothers and sisters, whom I long to see, my joy and crown, stand firm [like a soldier in battle maintaining his post] in the Lord in this way, my beloved. ² I urge <u>Euodia</u> [a name meaning "good" or "pleasant journey"] and I urge <u>Syntyche</u> [a name meaning "unifier;" we know nothing about these ladies other then they are colaborers with Paul and are mentioned in non-biblical sources as key players in the life of the Philippian church] to live in harmony in the Lord. ³ Indeed, true **COMPANION** [a word picturing two oxen in a yoke—pulling the same load; we don't know for sure who this significant one might be], I ask you also, help these women who have shared my struggle in the cause of the gospel, together with <u>Clement</u> [the only thing we know about him is his name] as well as the rest of my fellow workers, whose names are in the book of life [God has recorded the name of every person, from all time, who have trusted in Christ in the "Book of Life" (cf., Rev. 3:5; Dan. 12:1ff; Mal. 3:16; Luke 10:20; Rev. 17:8: 20:12) I think Paul is saying to the church, "We are all in this together for the long haul."].

2. The Prayer

Philippians 4:5–6, NASB95 - ⁵ Let your <u>gentle spirit</u> ["Gentleness" lit., "yielded rights"; Pastor Joe says, "I don't care who's right—I care what's right"] be known to all men. <u>The Lord is near</u> ["Near" refers to both location and time; the Lord is (1) in close proximity to each and all of us right now and (2) He is coming again to rescue this world—very, very soon]. ⁶ <u>Be anxious for nothing</u> [in the imperative mood; The word "anxious" describes being divided and pulled in different directions; Paul is saying "there is absolutely nothing that you should be worried about—nothing"], but in <u>everything</u> [the good and the bad] by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God [More on these words later; there are four words for prayer used in this one verse and we will look at each of those four words in our next message].

A. We must never be stressful in anything. (v. 6a)

Philippians 4:6, NLT - ⁶ <u>Don't worry about anything;</u> instead, <u>pray about everything</u>. Tell God what you need, and thank Him for all He has done.

B. We must always be thankful in everything. (v. 6b)

Philippians 4:6, NIV84 - 6, but <u>in everything</u>, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.

"You will never know <u>peace of mind</u> until you know the mind of Christ."

3. The Peace

Philippians 4:7, NASB95 - ⁷ And [then] the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts [from worry] and your minds in [preposition used in the genitive case indicating source; who is the Source of this unexplainable peace?] Christ Jesus.
