Study Section

Learning to be Content

1. "Contentment" is not automatic—it must be learned.

Philippians 4:10–11, NASB95 - ¹⁰ But I rejoiced in ["in Christ," in the genitive case, this Joy is "from" Christ—He is the source of 'Joy'] the Lord greatly [used only here in the NT], that now at last you have <u>revived</u> [no harshness in the Greek] your concern for me; indeed, you were concerned before, but you lacked opportunity. ¹¹ Not that I speak from want, for <u>I have learned to be content</u> [lit., "to hold what you have been given," from the root word meaning "satisfied" or "at rest"] in whatever circumstances I am.

2. "Contentment" depends on confidence in Christ (while happiness depends on circumstances).

Philippians 4:11–12, NASB95 - ¹¹ Not that I speak from want, for I have learned to be content in whatever circumstances I am. ¹² I know how to get along with humble means, and I also know how to live in prosperity; in any and every circumstance I have learned the secret of being filled and going hungry, both of having abundance and suffering need.

Philippians 4:12, TLB - 12 ... I have learned the secret of contentment in every situation....

3. "Contentment" rests on two biblical truths:

A. God has ordained every circumstance in my life—for His glory.

Proverbs 16:33, TLB - ³³ We toss the coin, but <u>it is the Lord who</u> controls its decision.

B. God will give me strength to do His will.

Philippians 4:13, NASB95 - ¹³ <u>I can do</u> [lit., 'endure'] all [these] things <u>through Him who strengthens me.</u> [VERY IMPORTANT: This verse <u>does not say</u>, "I can do whatever I want to do."]

Philippians 4:13, AMP - "I am self-sufficient <u>only in Christ's sufficiency."</u>

"When Things Don't Go Well"

By Rev. Dr. Theodore Parker Ferris (Circa 1950s) Wikipedia: "...one of the greatest preachers of this century."

- A. Remember that there is nothing happening to you that has not happened to millions of others.
- B. Remember that as a human being, living on this earth, that you secure the risks of things not going well (italics added).
- C. Remember that there are people who became great facing what you now face.
- Remember, contentment is the confidence that if I need anything else, God will give it to me.
- E. Remember when things don't go well this week, just say aloud, "God, since you are in control, I will be content...may Your purposes...and Your glory, not my comfort, be foremost my concern."
